History of Queen

Queen Cutlery Company, founded in Titusville, Pa. in 1918, operated it's first four years without an official name. Queen City was initially organized for the purpose of making contract knives; no name created no problem. The contract business was 100% from 1918 to 1922. In 1922, named in honor of the city in which it was founded, and the site of the first oil well, the founders adopted the name Queen City Cutlery Company, making 1922 the first official year for business. Queen Cutlery was initially founded by six foremen of the Schatt & Morgan Cutlery Company. It was rumored that each foreman would run off a few extra parts at the Schatt & Morgan factory and assemble the knives at their own operation, a garage behind the Titusville High School, known as a "moonlite" operation.

During the Great Depression, Schatt & Morgan realized that the sale of Queen City Cutlery was cutting into their own depressed sales and fired the six foremen. The loss of six supervisors in a small factory created more problems, and Schatt & Morgan went out of business in 1931. The six foreman then pooled their savings, bought the old Schatt & Morgan factory, and moved in about 1932. Queen knives are still made in the same factory.

#66 Muskrat - (Commemorative)

Many knives take their name from their uses. A muskrat knife is used by muskrat trappers to skin the animals. Queen's commemorative muskrat pattern #66 represents the 66 years of quality manufacturing Queen has enjoyed. The jiggling on the bone handle was done by Queen Cutlery, the first time Queen has ever done it's own jiggling. The improved muskrat blade is a rare blade which Queen has used only a few times over the past 66 years.

8155 4 Blade Congress - (Collectors)

This congress pattern is a favorite knife of carpenters and skilled workmen. The handle on Queen's congress pattern is made from various tropical trees yielding a valuable rosewood quality which workmen appreciate. Queen has only used rosewood a very limited number of times during 66 years of manufacturing. This pattern promises to be a valuable piece for the avid collector.
